- Goals for success

- Concise
- Theme-based
- Strength-based
- User-friendly
- Collaborative

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HOW TO USE THE ONE-PAGE SUMMARY IN AN IEP MEETING

- Virtual/in-person
- Interpreter
- Fun story/observation
- Introduce summary
- Explain colors
- Begin with strengths, move to areas in need of support
- Summary/recommendations when team is ready

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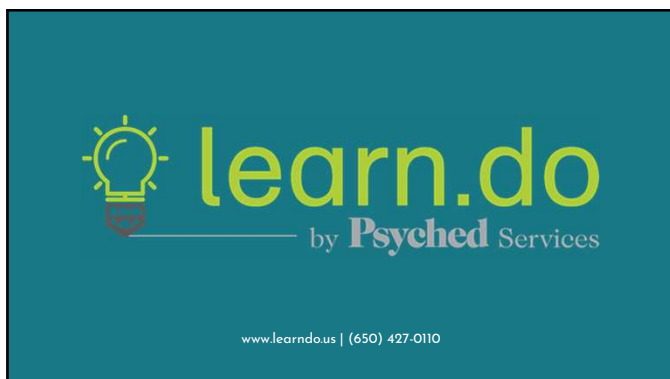
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
